**Thoughts: What Kills You!** 


• Friday, October 6<sup>TH</sup>, 2023: The PORSCHE Factory and Museum Visit, plus picking up our rental PORSCHES in Zuffenhausen and getting ready for Austria.

"We are off on another fabulous Fast Lane tour, this time with friends from the Pittsburgh area - the Millers and Fergusons.

After we had the mandatory drivers' briefing and the waiver signing, the fun began. We went to the local Cannstatter Volksfest (Oktoberfest in Stuttgart – much better than in Munich). It was a wonderfully crazy place with lots of beer, wine, food and German music. Peter had reserved tables (and private bathrooms) for our group. You haven't lived until you have seen and heard 10,000 slightly drunk Germans sing: "Take me Home Country Road!" It was a night to remember!

Today was the trip to the **Porsche Museum** followed by **rare PORSCHE Factory tours** - the impressive leather shop, 911
assembly, Taycan paint shop and the Taycan assembly. We have had other tours but never saw so many areas of production. I loved watching a GT3-RS going down the line. No pictures whatsoever are allowed.



The PORSCHE Factory is nothing whatsoever like Disney World where you buy a ticket and waltz in. It is an amazing privilege to be admitted to the

holiest of holiest for an inside look at the amazing craftsmanship to produce these magnificent machines.

After a spectacular lunch at the renowned **Christophorus Restaurant** upstairs at the Museum, we then picked up our 911 Cab and drove back as a group to our hotel... trying to get used to driving the 992 Cab.

Tonight we are looking forward to a true German dinner at Carls Brauhaus adjacent to the beautiful Schlossplatz.

• Saturday, October 7<sup>th</sup>, 2023: Driving from Stuttgart onto the no speed limit Autobahn, lunch in a Bavarian Chalet high up in the Alps, and the renowned Interalpen Hotel: Miro, our luggage logistics manager, was in the lobby collecting and registering all our large luggage and loading it into our luggage van, waiting outside. Gerald and Miro had all the cars lined up in the courtyard behind the hotel. Last night Gerald and Miro also spent a couple hours programming all the Porsches NAVI Systems with all destinations for this trip. At 9:00 am, I promptly announced, "saddle up" and we departed from the Hotel Graf Zeppelin in two driving groups, connected with our walkie talkies on two separate channels.

We departed downtown Stuttgart neatly in two teams, and we headed south on the B-27 until we reached the Autobahn A-8. Driving past the Stuttgart airport and under BOSCH Parking Structure we finally saw our favorite Autobahn sign – the speed limit of 120 is lifted, and we are now in the last vestige of automotive freedom: NO SPEED LIMIT. Of course, it's not at all a "free for all." It is highly disciplined, regulated, logical and safe. In fact, the fatality rate at US Interstates is 2½ times that of the German Autobahn!



We made our first "pit" stop in Gruibingen Süd on the A-8 – we didn't need gas, but everybody wanted to take a few-minutes break, ask questions about



some of their car's features or just stretch their legs. We then arrived, as scheduled, high up in the Bavarian Alps for our lunch. Flowers are everywhere this time of year. Every home in this region not only features this quaint Austrian/Bavarian architecture – but they all have balconies or window boxes with flowers cascading from them – it is simply magnificent. Even the balcony of our second hotel, the renowned Interalpen Hotel has beautiful flowers



underscoring the magnificent view south to the Tirolian Alps separating Austria from Italy. It is truly a 5-star hotel. Mark and Eileen Fischer vacationed in Dubai before this trip. Dubai is known for its incredible luxury. Their comment was that the Interalpen surpasses anything they enjoyed in



Dubai. This is the feedback we love when we get to spoil our guests. The meals at the Interalpen are simply amazing. There is no other breakfast buffet in the world surpassing the Interalpen.

**Sunday, October 8<sup>th</sup>, 2023:** Today we are heading across the ominous Timmelsjoch Mountain Pass separating Austria from Italy, and we returned via the Jaufen and Brenner Passes. We drove down from our mountain perch to the Austrian Autobahn and headed for Sölden in the Ötztal (Tal = Valley in German). It is known as one of the top three ski resort areas in Austria.

**But it is also known for a fascinating find** up in the Similaun Glacier above Sölden: Source: euronews. In September 1991, German hikers high up in the Ötztal Alps, an Italian valley near the border with Austria, stumbled upon a shocking discovery: a frozen corpse trapped in the ice.

The remains belonged to a man who had died around 5,400 years earlier, a victim of an arrow attack to the back. Alongside the body were discovered remnants of clothing and equipment, including a copper axe, a longbow, and a bearskin hat.

Nicknamed Ötzi, after the valley where he was found, the iceman's discovery captivated the global imagination, providing unprecedented insights into ancient European civilizations and granting scientists unparalleled access to the past.

The enigma surrounding his violent demise, his identity, and the circumstances of his presence on a mountain pass has sparked intrigue extending well beyond the realm of archaeology.

Born: c. 3275 BC; near the present village of Feldthurns (Velturno), north of Bolzano, Italy

Died: c. 3230 BC (aged about 45); Ötztal Alps, near Tisenjoch on the border between Austria and Italy

Known for: Oldest natural mummy of a Chalcolithic (Copper Age) European man

At first it was thought that Ötzi had died in an accident in the mountains. It was only in 2001 that an X-ray revealed a flint arrowhead in his left shoulder, after which a 2 cm entry wound was discovered in his back. The arrow severed the subclavian artery, indicating that Ötzi bled to death within a matter of minutes. Ötzi also suffered a severe head injury – probably at the same time as the arrow wound. This could have



been caused by a fall or a blow to the head. Perhaps Ötzi pulled out the arrow himself, or perhaps his murderer did. The arrowhead broke off when the arrow shaft was removed and is still in his body. The shape of the arrowhead corresponds to that of other flint arrowheads found in the area, including the ones Ötzi was carrying himself.

#### Murder on the glacier

There can be no doubt that Ötzi was murdered. A few days before his death, he was involved in hand-to-hand combat and had received a deep cut to his right hand. The evidence therefore suggests that Ötzi was being pursued and was confronted by one or more attackers. There are still many open questions, and some may never be solved. Why was he murdered and by whom? Was the motive revenge, jealousy, hierarchy, greed? Why didn't Ötzi's attacker take any of his equipment, even though the copper axe alone must have been of enormous value? Or was something stolen that we don't know about? Why on earth did Ötzi flee to the glacier?

## Back to today . . . Sunday, October 8<sup>th</sup>, 2023: Once past

Sölden we started to climb the Austrian side of the Pass. Once we crested the top, we were looking at one of THE most delightful PORSCHE Roads in Europe. On top of the pass is a famous motorcycle museum. We enjoyed a pit





stop and the amazing view. We then arrived in St. Leonard for a delightful Italian lunch. Most importantly Thomas was successful in getting the parking reserved and roped off for our arrival . . . a rarity in Italy. The Brenner Pass, of course was busy since it's the main route from Italy north since Roman times.

• Monday, October 9<sup>th</sup>: Something fun and different – the Achenseebahn. It was about an hour's drive. We boarded the oldest European cog-wheel train, operating since 1889, of course, in our reserved private train car. We chugged up to the town of Seespitz where a steamboat was waiting for us to take us to Pertisau to THE best place in town for lunch.









Not only does John Horne superbly drive the Panamera 4S we have been assigned but he is also adept at driving a train.



On the way back it was Joe Ferguson's turn to drive and shovel coal.



Today was a fabulous interlude from driving the Autobahn and mountain passes. Our goal is to take you to places and enjoy events you would never find on your own. Once again the first and most important element of our trip arrangements was secure reserved parking. Thank you my friend Joschi.

#### Tuesday, October 10<sup>TH</sup>, 2023: A little Zell am See


