Revision Surgery Update

We also had a fun moment this week: Peter was invited onto a podcast to talk about his work, his passion and some of the stories that have shaped him over the years. And in a fun upgrade to the process, the team didn't just record audio — they filmed him as well. Peter joked that he wasn't sure whether he was supposed to talk or prepare for his close-up, but he handled it like a natural. The conversation was lively, thoughtful, and full of those classic Peter moments where he drops a line that makes everyone pause and smile.

One of the things that has impressed me while knowing Peter, and as you all may well know, is that Peter's life experiences and historical knowledge is fascinating. I always enjoy the moments he steals away in his head and gives history lessons which then evolve into life lessons. This week I am summarizing a wonderful story Peter told over lunch one day.

Earlier in the week, we joined Peter and along the lines of conversation, Peter thought of another tid-bit of History. As we were discussing Austria as being one of my favorite countries to visit, this story must have been sitting in his mind. Peter countered my comment with another piece of Austrian history: the Battle of Vienna in 1683.

It's one of those dramatic turning points in Europe's story. Kara Mustafa Pasha led a massive Ottoman army into Central Europe, expecting a decisive victory. Instead, a coalition of European forces — including the famous Polish cavalry under King Jan Sobieski — broke the siege in a sweeping counterattack. The Ottoman army retreated, and the defeat marked the beginning of a long shift in power across the region.

But the part that really sticks with you is what happened afterward. Kara Mustafa Pasha wore a green silk cord around his neck during the campaign — a symbolic gift from the Sultan. The meaning was painfully clear: if he returned unsuccessful, that same cord would be used to execute him. And after the defeat at Vienna, that's exactly what happened. He was executed in Belgrade on December 25, 1683, with that very cord — considered a more “gentlemanly” method for high-ranking officials, though the symbolism was unmistakable.



Thus, people began wearing silk ties around their necks.

It's such a striking contrast — one simple strand of silk, and two very different stories. In one moment, silk carried the weight of duty and consequence. In another, it became something elegant, personal, and expressive. That is the part of history I keep coming back to: the material itself doesn't decide the meaning. People do. We take what we're given — a thread, a story, a place, a season — and we shape it into something new.

And maybe that's why Peter's little history lessons stay with me. They remind me that travel does the very same thing. It takes old roads, old stones, old traditions, and somehow turns them into fresh wonder.

Which brings us quite beautifully to Tuscany — a place that has mastered the art of turning simple things into something unforgettable: sunlight on a hillside, grapes on a vine, flour and olive oil on a table, and strangers becoming friends over a glass of wine.

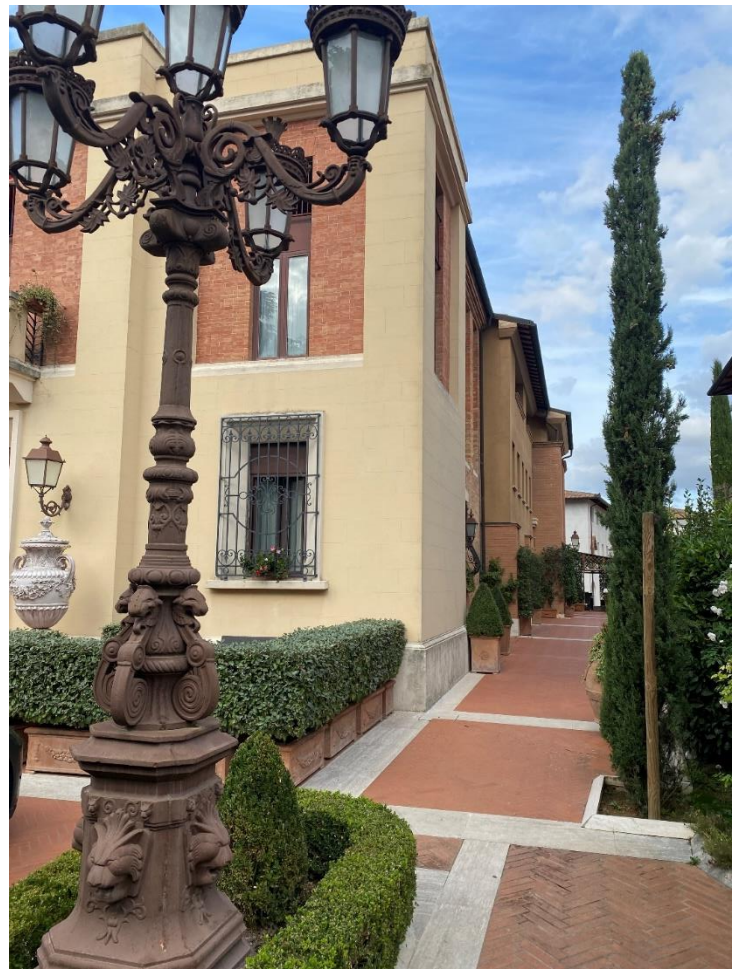

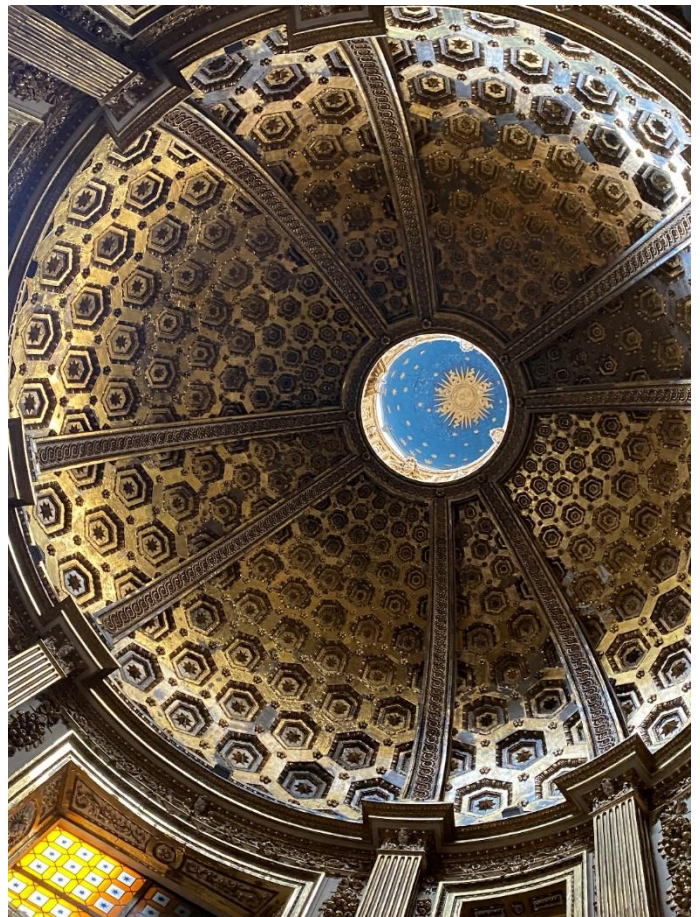
